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Recent activities

FUNDING AND SUPPORT FOR EALC

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The Bradford Education Alliance for Life Chances (EALC) has successfully secured £200,000 in funding from the Westlake Foundation for the next two years. This funding will enable EALC to continue its impactful work and provide crucial support to Leeds Evidence Innovation Partnership (LEIP) during its early development phase.



EALC has taken an exciting step forward by submitting a £5M funding application to the National Lottery Fund. The application has already passed through a rigorous selection process and is now in the final review stage. If successful, this funding will be instrumental in continuing its transformative Act Locally programme and expanding its impact to other communities. In light of this, EALC has already initiated discussions with schools in Armley to establish a convening partnership aimed at addressing the unique needs of this community.

INTEGRATION WITH WEST YORKSHIRE FUTURES INSTITUTE

The CHORAL Improving Childhood Wellbeing theme is now integrated within the 'West Yorkshire Futures Institute,' led by Anne Longfield, CBE. This strategic integration significantly enhances our influence within the West Yorkshire Integrated Care Board (WY ICB) and the West Yorkshire Combined Authority (WYCA). By leveraging this collaboration, we aim to shape policies and initiatives that will improve health and social care outcomes for children across the region, ensuring a brighter future for all communities within West Yorkshire.

Born and Bred in Leeds

A DATA LINKAGE COHORT STUDY OF BABIES BORN IN LEEDS AND THEIR MOTHERS



BaBi Leeds is a longitudinal data collection project to help link information from pregnant patient records and child's patient records to be used for research and service planning, to improve health and services in Leeds. All data is anonymised and stored securely.

BaBi Leeds is now into its 3rd year of recruitment and has just reached its 5000th participant and our target is to reach 35% of booked women at LTHT. Please see our second-year infographic for more information.


With funding from CHORAL, this event was attended by a divserse group which included healthcare professionals, researchers, and community members, all united by a shared interest in improving paediatric care.

Tell us about your research:

My research is studying the experiences of families who give medicines to their infants and young children at home. I am using a theory called resilience theory, which looks for adaptions that people make when faced with disruptions to their lives. Find out more at: www.minimeds.net

What's your proudest achievement?

Career wise it would be getting my NIHR doctoral fellowship funding. Undoubtedly one of the hardest processes I have been through. But now I am doing a PhD it has changed my life in ways I never foresaw.

If you could choose anyone to have dinner with, who would it be and why? Aside from families and loved ones!....I would say Wendy Mitchell. I wanted to meet her, but sadly she died earlier this year. I loved her book 'Somebody I used to know'. Reading her work with the Dementia Engagement and Empowerment Project (DEEP) as a researcher I find very inspiring. She was also an excellent baker and so I definitely would have asked her to bring desert!

What are you reading at the moment?

I'm working my way through "The Journal of a Disappointed Man" by W.N.P. Barbellion (aka Bruce Frederick Cummings). It's regarded as an unsung classic of British literature. Think non-fiction by a 1900s version of Adrian Mole.

What is your favourite place in Yorkshire?

So many choices! I try not to overlook the little things, so I'd go with Leeds City Centre. There's some amazing buildings I walk/cycle past every day on my commute (town hall, university campus, corn exchange, park square, etc.), museums, a good underground music scene, great food and drink, loads of fabulous independent businesses too.

What is your favourite inspirational quote?

Patient and their families, the NHS and NIHR quite rightly encourages us to deliver patient benefit asap. However, sometimes the quickest response may not be the most appropriate. This quote helps remind me to avoid jumping to solutions and to take a more considered approach instead:

"The question 'What we might build tomorrow?' blinds us to the question of our ongoing responsibilities for what we built yesterday." - Dourish and Mainwaring 2012.

If you could give new researchers one piece of advice, what would it be? Find your tribe. It can be really difficult, especially if you are in an isolated place (e.g. new to Leeds, working somewhere that isn't research active, interested in methods that not many people use). But thankfully we now have CHORAL which should make this much easier. Peer support is a fundamental part of being successful, people to help you through difficult times and celebrate success with!
